

Carmen Rîjnoveanu

Carmen Rîjnoveanu is a distinguished researcher and expert in security and defense studies, with an extensive academic background and professional experience in military history, strategic analysis, and policy development.

She earned a Ph.D. in Political Science from the National University of Political Studies and Public Administration in 2017. She also holds a Master's degree in International Relations (2000-2002) and a Bachelor's degree in History (1996-2000), both from the University of Bucharest.

Throughout her career, Carmen Rîjnoveanu has specialized in defense resources management, NATO security cooperation, crisis management, and defense institution building, completing advanced training programs in Romania, Germany, Bulgaria, and Ukraine.

Her professional journey began in 2002 as a Research Assistant at the Institute for Political Studies of Defense and Military History within the Ministry of National Defense. She later held roles as a Scientific Researcher (2004-2016), Head of the Security Policies Office (2016-2018), and Deputy Director (2020). Since June 15, 2021, she has served as Director of the Institute for Political Studies of Defense and Military History. Additionally, she was an Associate Professor at the National Defense University "Carol I" between 2021 and 2022.

Beyond her institutional roles, Carmen Rîjnoveanu is actively involved in international security and defense research. She has been a member of the PfP Consortium of Defense Academies and Security Studies Institutes since 2003 and has contributed to multiple working groups on regional stability, conflict studies, and military history. In 2020, she was appointed Secretary-General of the Romanian Commission of Military History and has been serving on the Executive Board of the International Commission of Military History since 2015.

She is a member of the editorial boards of several academic journals, including *Res Politicae*, *Monitor Strategic*, and the *Military History Review*.
